

A MESSAGE
FROM
MARIE MORTON,
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



What a difference a year makes. Last year, as we were reviewing the 2021-2022 fiscal year, we were talking about COVID variants, lockdowns, and a lot of uncertainty. We had a new outreach vehicle and two new Board members. We were just starting to see the glimmer of hope that we would be able to start returning to in-person activities.

In the 2022-2023 fiscal year, we saw a lot of change, a return of hope, but also new unanticipated challenges most frequently referred to as "post-pandemic recovery." We have changed, as individuals, as an agency, as a society. Although we spent the 2022-2023 year still navigating COVID as a public health emergency, restrictions slowly lessened or were removed, and we collectively began emerging. Initially, some people clung to the safety of pandemic-era adaptations of the virtual world. We learned some good lessons. Virtual meetings save a whole lot of drive time. Hybrid work models can bring work-life balance. It is smart to stay home when you are sick, and it is okay to mask in public places. But by and large, as the world re-opened, people flocked to in-person opportunities, yearned to gather, and many seemed eager to make up for lost time. We see that trend continuing now.

2022-2023 saw transformations at CAYR as well. We saw some long-standing, trusted staff members move on to

exciting new opportunities. With those departures, we have welcomed new faces that bring new perspectives, skills, and experience to our work. We launched important, new projects. With new 5-year funding from the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC), CAYR started an innovative new Hep C program and with it came new staff positions, new Hep C testing drives for York Region, new education opportunities, and new engagement with our service users.

The other key point of growth for CAYR last year was the addition of a staff position dedicated to promoting and distributing HIV Self-Testing kits. Although CAYR had been a distribution site for HIV self-testing kits since they were approved for use in Canada, that work had always been an add-on task to existing staff. However, in 2022, CAYR lobbied for funding from PHAC to support a dedicated position and along with it access to as many HIV self-testing kits as we could distribute.

It was a year that saw a lot of hard work by staff and our volunteers, including the Board of Directors. At every challenge, CAYR rose to the challenge. By bringing wholistic Hep C and HIV Self-Testing programs to York Region, CAYR has risen to meet our Mission and Vision at a new level.

WHO WE WORK WITH


We offer specialized and combined programs for:


